<b>Applicable License or Registration</b>	MDH food license (through MDH or a local health dept.) required if meals are provided. HWS registration may apply. Condos and coops generally do not provide home care services. Exempt from HWS registration.	DHS foster care home license (which is administered by the counties) required. Each setting may be licensed for up to 4 adults or up to 5 adults, if all residents are age 60 or older. HWS registration applies only to corporate foster care providers meeting the HWS criteria. Home care license is required if the home is registered as HWS and directly provides “health related” services.	MDH food license and lodging license (through MDH or a local health dept.), sometimes called board and lodging or hotel/motel. Lodging license required for establishments providing sleeping accommodations and meals to 5+ people for 1 week or more. HWS registration or B & L “special services” registration may be required. Home care license is required if registered as HWS and directly provide “health related” services.	MDH boarding care home license required for those homes that provide only personal or custodial care and related services for 5 or more aged/infirm persons over 16 years of age. Non-certified homes are not certified to participate in the MA program and do not provide “nursing” services. HWS registration may apply, and if so, the home may choose to obtain a home care license (nursing services may be provided under a home care license in non-certified homes).	Nursing home license from MDH is required where nursing care is provided to 5 or more persons (excludes hospitals, clinics, etc.)
<b>Population Served</b>	Primarily persons age 55 and older.	Primarily persons age 55 and older.	Functionally impaired adults at least 18 years old.	If registered as HWS, they primarily serve persons age 55 and older unless the B & L registers voluntarily. If not HWS, some limitations apply on types of residents that may be served. 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<b>Physical Characteristics</b>	Private apartments with full kitchens. There may be common spaces for congregate dining and other activities. Buildings designed for “assisted living” may have smaller units with “kitchenettes” and may cluster units around a shared parlor or feature other innovative designs.	Private living units in a multi-family building or other type of development (e.g., townhouse, patio home, etc.). There may be common spaces for congregate dining and other activities.	<b>Family foster care</b> is provided in a private home, which is the primary residence of the license holder. <b>Corporate foster care homes</b> may be provided in existing single-family homes or duplexes, in “purpose built” buildings, or may even be found within apartment buildings. Rooms may be private or shared. Dining areas, bathrooms and other spaces are shared “family-style.” Corporate homes serving residents with memory loss may have special security features to prevent wandering and an enclosed outside area.	Private or shared rooms, often with a bath attached, though older buildings may have a “dorm” style bathroom. The rooms may look like studio apartments (but without the kitchen). There are common areas for congregate dining and for other activities. Those B & Ls serving residents with memory loss may have special security features to prevent wandering and an enclosed outside area.	Private or shared rooms, usually with a bath attached. <b>Typical Services</b>	Most offer social and recreational services and scheduled transportation to shopping. Many offer at least one meal 5-7 days per week. <b>Available Funding</b>	Federal (and occasionally local) rent subsidies may be available. Minnesota's AC or EW programs may cover the cost of services for eligible tenants.	Minnesota's AC or EW program might cover the cost of services for qualified owner occupants with limited incomes.	GRH may be available to cover room and board costs. Services may be covered by EW or AC.	GRH may be available for room and board costs. Services may be covered by EW or AC.	MA is not available to non-certified boarding care homes. Non-certified homes may receive GRH for room and board costs and may receive Supplementary Service rates to cover services for qualified residents who are not eligible for MA.
